RESEARCH INTERESTS

My research focuses on institutions which help build policy consensus among stakeholders and others with differing knowledge, interests, and values. In particular, I focus on institutions that have no formal or informal decision-making authority, but provide informed recommendations to policymakers. In my published research, I use various methods including game theory, statistical models, and lab and survey experiments.

JOB MARKET PAPER

“Including a broad range of stakeholders on advisory commissions builds consensus.”

The job market paper argues that including a broad range of stakeholders on advisory commissions increases the likelihood of consensual policy recommendations, for two reasons. First, stakeholders can make their proposals more attractive by incorporating policy-specific knowledge. Second, on a purely advisory commission, any member who objects to the commission proposal can issue a dissenting opinion, dissuading the government from adopting the proposal. I show these results in a formal model, then test the model’s empirical implications. The tests use a novel, hand-collected data set from Sweden, where governments appoint commissions for all significant legislative initiatives. The data cover a 29-year period, during which there was significant variation in both party system polarization and the policy environment. The results match the model’s predictions and general patterns in data from several other countries. In sum, advisory commissions are an institutional setting in which preference heterogeneity can overcome polarization rather than cause gridlock.
